

CirCLER - Circular Economy Transition Manager: guiding companies of the furniture value chain to deploy their transition strategy for a more circular economy





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D3.2 ESCO Furniture Sector Occupations Affected by Sector CE Transition WP 3 / T3.4

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1. Introduction

As the EU furniture sector responds to the Circular Economy, an emerging occupation profile is that of a Circular Economy Transition Manager (CETM). In order to establish the training requirements for a CETM, WorkPackage (WP) 3 aimed to identify the skills, gaps and needs of this occupation. A report, D3.1, on the Skills, Knowledge and Competencies (SKCs) was produced based on a survey of the sector and a workshop conducted with experts in the EU furniture sector.

This second deliverable of WP3 is D3.2, which examines the classifications of European Skills, Competencies and Occupations (ESCO) that are affected by the sector CE transition. A database of the full 3039 occupations was searched at https://esco.ec.europa.eu/en/classification/occupation_main. The focus was on ESCO

The focus was on ESCO occupations in the furniture sector that require an update of skills, knowledge, and competencies to address the circular transition of companies. The new joint curriculum for the CETM covers part of these new SKC needs. An analysis of the links between the existing ESCO occupations and the new SKCs required for the furniture sector to transition to the CE was carried out.

This will support the development of pills that can be recommended to those occupational profiles to update their SKCs. To support existing occupations working in the EU furniture sector who wish to improve their ability to transition to the CE a skills self-evaluation tool will be developed by CirCLER (D5.2). It is planned that this tool will enable occupations identified in this deliverable to determine their SKC gaps and to identify suitable CirCLER pills to bridge those gaps. The proposed tool will take the form of an open online tool where professionals will be able to evaluate their level of SKC in the areas of expertise covered by the CirCLER toolkit.

60 profiles, to ESCO level 5, linked to the furniture industry were identified along with a description and indication of whether the occupation is least, somewhat or most affected by the circular transition of companies affected by the circular transition of companies. For example, the *Industrial Designer* (2163.1) will be most affected by the CE transition to ensure products, service and systems are designed to be circular while comparably a *Pulp Control Operator* (3139.3) will be least affected.
